It is right and fair that MLAs not only face cuts to their mileage and office expenses, but it could also be argued that MLAs should not be able to agree pay increases for themselves unless all public sector pay, the minimum wage, pensions and benefits are rising by at least the same percentage as any proposed MLA pay increase.

We also believe that MLAs should not be paid for using their house as a premises while working at home. As regards question seven, few if any people working in other professions get paid for using their house to work from home in, therefore there should be no proposed £2,000 personal allowance if MLAs use part of their home as an office.

There is a crisis of public confidence in politics in Northern Ireland. People are massively disillusioned with politics here and the role that politicians play. The public have been forced to bear the brunt of austerity cuts, redundancies and pay cuts and freezes. The public have in recent years often had more pressure placed on them to deliver in work and have often faced pressure to work increasing amounts of overtime during the downturn, therefore it is understandable that people are frustrated with the MLA expenses system and its essential that many of the reforms which are at the very least as stringent as those outlined here take place.

Also the public will quite rightly be annoyed at the levels of mileage expense claims because many members of the public do not get travel expenses for their journey from home to work.

It is also essential that the Executive and political parties act to break down any barriers to getting involved in elected politics. The demographics of our society is not accurately reflected in the demographics of the people who are Assembly members, and this must be addressed as a matter of urgency. Women, people from minority ethnic backgrounds and people who are LGBT are under-represented and strong action must be taken to ensure equality and break down any barriers to being involved in politics.
